





THE CITY

The Arabs named Almería Al-Mariyya, which means 'mirror of the sea'. There is an Eastern feel to this sun-bleached city with its Moorish-style houses and signature Alcazaba fortress. The links to the North of Africa remain strong with frequent ferries going to Morocco and Algeria. In the Plaza Vieja, the town hall preserves the banner presented by the Catholic Monarchs when they banished the Moors in 1489.

DO & SEE

A rewarding stroll around Almería's city centre is rewarding. Begin from Puerta de Purchena through the labyrinthine streets of the historic quarter. Then, continue to its busy port via colonnaded squares and the fortified Cathedral. Along the way, you can stop for a coffee or a glass of Spanish wine. Do not miss the lively food market just off the Rambla.

La Alcazaba Monument



The Alcazaba Monument is a 10th-century fortress with three huge enclosures, gardens, and the Walls of Hayrán extending down the valley

to the opposing San Cristobál hill. Warrens of cave houses are cut into the rock below. From here you will have great views of the city and port, not to mention the most legendary sunsets.

Cathedral of Almería



With its towers, buttresses and sturdy walls, the 16th-century Cathedral was built to serve as a place of worship and defence

against the pirate raids from North Africa. The cathedral's Gothic interior comprises three naves and three chapels. Daily guided tours offer visitors the opportunity to explore the entire cathedral.

Arabic Aljibes



Located beneath the Flamenco Club El Taranto, the Arabic Aljibes are perfectly preserved 11th-century Moorish water cisterns.

These wells used to be part of the water network that supplied both the inhabitants of Almería and the military troops. Currently, the Arab Cisterns host an array of exhibitions throughout the year.

Plaza de la Constitución



The unique Constitution Square is one of the oldest squares in the city. In the Moorish times this was the main marketplace and a spot

for activities such as bullfights and local festivals. Today, the square is home to the Town Hall building, built in the late 19th century, and The Monument to the Martyrs of Liberty, which is located in the centre of the square.

El Cable Inglés Monument



El Cable Inglés is an iron architecture masterpiece. It is located next to the Levante dock on Almadrabillas beach. It was built with the

purpose of abandoning rudimentary systems for loading the iron ore from the mines of Alquife in Granada.

It consists of two distinct parts: the access connecting the railway station to the loading dock, and the actual dock through which trains could unload directly into the ships. For enthusiasts of architecture, a visit to the Cable Inglés is essential due to its innovative design and historical significance.

ferries daily cross to and from Morocco and Algeria.

Intermodal Bus & Train Station of Almería



The Intermodal station serves as the primary transportation hub, accommodating both bus and train services. It connects Almería to other

major cities in Andalucia and Madrid Atocha, which takes around six hours. There are also ferry connections to Morocco and Algeria. As of now, Almería does not have a high-speed rail line. The closest high-speed train line is located in Murcia, which can reach Madrid in 2 hours and 45 minutes. In terms of bus services, Alsa is the primary company operating at the Intermodal station.

Passport & Visa



Spain can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of most European countries, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea,

Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, the UAE and most countries in America. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport, but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.

Non-Schengen travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter. If you are unsure about visa requirements, it's advisable to contact the Spanish embassy in your country or region.


