



THE CITY

There is a plethora of pleasures to be experienced in Ballina, Byron Bay, and the surrounding areas. Creative types are particularly attracted to this region, with many authors and filmmakers seeking inspiration alongside surfers and sun lovers.

Ballina originally gained its reputation as a fishing and timber port on the wide Richmond River. Then, road transportation took over, leading to one of the most curious decisions in town planning history: Ballina's main street was set back from the river, with buildings on both sides blocking river views. However, this has now changed with the development of the river foreshore area.

Only three decades ago, Byron Bay was a small, sleepy enclave unaware of the hustle and bustle it would later experience. Nowadays, it has a small-town charm mixed with a cosmopolitan yet alternative — lifestyle that attracts people from all over the world. Among its attractions are kilometres of unbroken sandy beaches and excellent surf waves, as well as pristine nature and wildlife. Due to its location as Australia's most eastern point, majestic humpback whales can be spotted twice a year on their migratory routes. There is always a local market taking place somewhere, and several festivals occur throughout the year.

Despite its reputation as a laid-back and alternative coastal town, Byron Bay is anything but boring. Visitors have the time of their lives in both Ballina and Byron Bay.

DO & SEE

Seven Mile Beach



Just a few kilometres north of Ballina's centre, Seven Mile Beach is one of Australia's finest and longest beaches. Wildlife, including dolphins and

eagles, populates the area. Swimming, surfing and sunbathing are of course the recommended activities.

instructor.

The Australian Seabird Rescue, Research, Rehabilitation and Coastal Education Centre in Ballina offers a comprehensive

educational experience for people of all ages. Participants experience first hand the issues in their local environment. The interactive, hands on approach gives everyone an unforgettable experience that they can take home and share with others.

All presentations include a one hour informative talk by one of their trained volunteers, as well as a chance to see wildlife that may be in their care. Animals that you may get the opportunity to get a close-up look at may include pelicans, other sea birds, shore birds, and even the fascinating and endangered sea turtles.

Airports



Byron Bay is easily accessible by air with a choice of three airports within a 2-hour drive of Byron Bay. The closest airport is only 25

minutes' drive.

1. The Ballina Byron Bay Gateway Airport (BNK) This airport is within 5 kilometres of Ballina town centre and is a quick scenic road trip from Byron Bay (25 minutes) and Lismore (30 minutes). Various shuttle buses connect the airport to Byron Bay and other regional destinations.

2. Gold Coast Airport (OOL)

The airport at Coolangatta, just over the border in Queensland, is served by all domestic Australian carriers and some international ones. Various shuttle buses connect to Byron Bay in about 40 minutes and in about 2 hours to Ballina.

3. Brisbane Airport (BNE)

Located at Eagle Farm on the eastern side of Brisbane, this airport is served by all domestic and most international carriers. A light rail runs

directly from Brisbane Roma Street transit terminal, which has a choice of buses to Byron Bay. There are also direct shuttles to Byron Bay, which take about two hours.

On the coast of New South Wales, summer lasts from December to February and can get very hot and busy. Spring (September through

November) and autumn (March through May) are great for avoiding the crowds but still being able to enjoy warm days and outdoor activities like sunbathing or surfing at the beach. The former is also the season with a lower chance of rainfall. July is the coldest month, but winter in the Ballina Byron region is still quite mild, with an average minimum of about 12°C.
