Set on the banks of the River Foyle in Northern Ireland, Derry (officially Londonderry) is one of Europe's best-preserved walled cities. The Bogside murals and Free Derry Corner stand as records of The Troubles, and the "Hands Across the Divide" monument marks the city's hard-won steps towards peace. Named UK City of Culture in 2013, Derry has earned a reputation for great food, live music and a thriving arts scene. The rugged Causeway Coast, a UNESCO-listed stretch of dramatic basalt columns, is just a short drive away.

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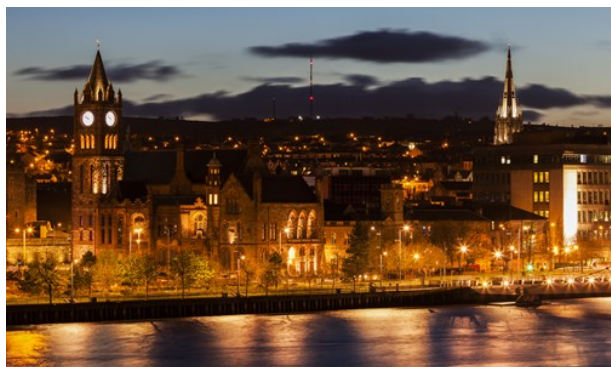

THE CITY

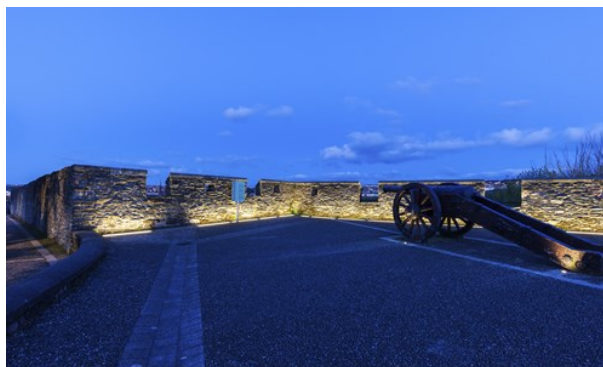
Northern Ireland's second-largest city is located on the border with Donegal, Republic of Ireland. From the Irish Doire (meaning "oak tree") Derry, or the Maiden City, was renamed Londonderry in 1613 during the Plantation of Ulster. The name is still a source of contention, with Nationalists calling the city Derry and Unionists preferring the official Londonderry, with the former being most commonly used colloquially.

The city is famous as the scene of Bloody Sunday, one of the grimmest massacres of The Troubles, and in recent years both communities have worked at breaching the political divide symbolised in the sobering statue "Hands Across the Divide", which shows two persons reaching out to hold hands across a crevice.

Native city of poet and Nobel Prize winner Seamus Heaney, Derry has a strong literary, as well as musical tradition, evident in the vibrant art centre and an abundance of theatres and galleries. Derry is the only remaining walled city in Ireland, and is one of the finest examples of a walled city in Europe.

Revelling in its cultural heritage, it also looks with pride and confidence into the future.

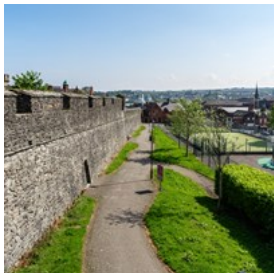
Saint Columb's Cathedral and Chapter

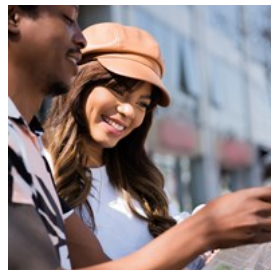
Tower Museum

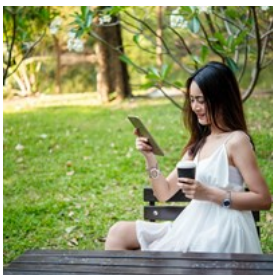

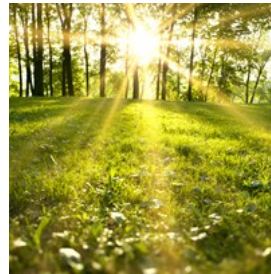

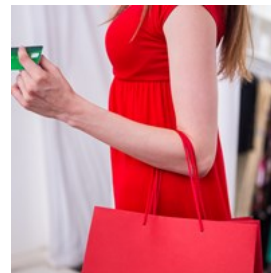

The City of Derry Airport (LDY)



The City of Derry Airport is located 12.5 kilometres from Derry City Centre.

Taxis are the quickest and most reliable way to get to and from the airport and can be found outside the airport terminal.

Connecting bus services are available to and from the airport at various times each day and leave passengers at the Ulsterbus Depot, Foyle Street, Derry City Centre. The journey to Derry City Centre takes about 30 minutes.

The AIRporter service operates six times per day to and from the AIRporter's City Centre base at the Quayside Shopping Centre. It is advisable to make a reservation. Reservations are free, guarantee a seat and you only pay on the day you travel.

You can also buy your ticket directly from the driver on board the coach on most services.

Passport & Visa



For travel to the UK (including Northern Ireland), citizens of the EU, EEA, and Switzerland (except Irish citizens) need an Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA). However, those planning to work or study in the UK for more than six months will need to obtain the appropriate visa. Additionally, residents of nine other countries — including Australia, Canada, Hong Kong, Japan, Malaysia, New Zealand, Singapore, South Korea, and the United States — can also visit the UK for up to six months without a visa, but they will still need an ETA. To ensure a smooth journey, it is advisable to consult the UK government website for any specific visa requirements or regulations.
