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


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


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## THE CITY



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Genoa (Genova in Italian), known as the birthplace of both Christopher Columbus and Paganini, boasts Italy's largest port and was famously described by Charles Dickens in 1844 as "a city of the strangest contrasts." Genoa's landscape is a fascinating mix of Renaissance palaces, grand 19th-century boulevards, and gilded Baroque churches that coexist alongside a labyrinth of steep medieval streets. Amidst the narrow alleys, visitors can stumble upon fine restaurants and chic bars. Exploring and getting lost in the medieval guarter, which is one of Europe's largest, is an essential part of the Genoa experience. With one of the biggest universities in Italy, Genoa's student population guarantees a buzzing nightlife.

## DO & SEE



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Being one of the best-kept travel destinations secrets, Genoa for sure offers many beautiful and interesting tourist attractions. There are over a dozen museums and galleries, a prestigious theatre, the largest aquarium in Europe and many renowned landmarks to visit, providing visitors with a range of options to explore.

Most of the popular tourist spots are located near Piazza de Ferrari, the city's main square, or by the old Port of Genoa. Other notable sights include Palazzo Ducale, Palazzi dei Rolli, and the Medieval Quarter. To gain a deeper understanding of the town's geography and history, a boat tour is widely recommended, with a variety of boat trips departing from Genoa harbour.

#### Strada Nuova Museums



Designated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2006, Via Garibaldi is lined with resplendent Renaissance palaces, constructed by Genoa's

wealthiest families during the 16th and 17th centuries. Palazzo Bianco is home to an extensive collection of Italian and Flemish art, featuring works by illustrious artists such as Rubens, Van Dyck, and Caravaggio. Meanwhile, Palazzo Rosso showcases an incredible collection of art that has been amassed over the course of two centuries by the Brignole-Sale family.

## **Medieval Quarter**



The Medieval Quarter in Genoa, which happens to be one of the largest in Europe, is characterized by its network of narrow caruggi (alleys) that

meander through the heart of the city, going up, down, and across. The structures lining these alleys can soar up to six stories high, and in some areas, the alleys are so narrow that they barely span a few meters. Despite their diminutive size, these alleys conceal a wealth of superb restaurants, bars, and shops. Getting lost in this labyrinthine quarter is practically unavoidable, and it always proves to be a fascinating experience.

#### Piazza San Matteo

#### Palazzo Reale



Constructed by the Balbi family in the 17th century, the Palazzo Reale (also known as Palazzo Stefano Balbi) was originally a sprawling

aristocratic residence for three of the most powerful families in the city: the Balbis, Durazzos, and Savoys. Today, it serves as a museum and boasts an extensive collection of historical furniture, paintings, and sculptures. Visitors can also explore the impressive garden, which is teeming with lush vegetation and exotic flora.

#### Camogli



Camogli is a stunning fishing village and tourist resort located on the west side of the peninsula of Portofino around 20 km east of Genoa. Visitors

#### Anita Garibaldi Promenade in Nervi



Beginning at the Nervi marina, Anita Garibaldi's Walk is a picturesque 2-km route that leads to the ancient port of Capolungo in Noli.

Originally, it was an ancient trail utilized by fishermen and farmers in the early 1800s to access fishing spots and agricultural land that abutted the sea. Nowadays, it's a popular destination for couples and families seeking a romantic stroll in one of the world's most breathtaking locations. The mesmerizing views and stunning colours of the Riviera make it an experience well worth having.

#### Palazzi dei Rolli



The Palazzi dei Rolli is an open-air museum located in the heart of Genoa. showcasing a collection of palaces constructed during the 16th and 17th centuries to house the most influential

aristocratic families of Genoa. This project also resulted in the reorganization of the street system in the historic centre, known today as 'Strade Nuove', which includes Via Garibaldi, Via Cairoli, Via Bensa, and Via Balbi. Visitors can explore the area and admire the buildings, such as Palazzo Rosso from the 17th century, as well as Palazzo Bianco and Palazzo Doria Tursi, both from the 16th century.

Victory Square, or Piazza della Vittoria, holds a significant place in Genoa as not only one of its largest squares, but also as one of the most

important ones. Dominating the square is the impressive Arch of Victory, which is also referred to as the War Memorial of the Fallen. This arch is a tribute to the Genoese soldiers who lost their lives during the First World War. Additionally, the square boasts lawns that are adorned with engravings of the symbols of Columbus's ships.

Genoa and Liguria are famous for pesto, the delicious pasta sauce made from basil, pine nuts, olive oil, and parmesan. However, if you think you know pesto just because you buy it in a jar, think again! There is nothing quite like the taste of freshly made, vivid-green pesto served with the local pasta, such as the little twists of troffie or spaghetti-like trenette.

Other specialities include farinata, a bread-like snack made from chickpeas, a must-try, and the local focaccia. The region's fish dishes, particularly salt cod-baccalà, are also highly recommended, as are mushroom dishes and stuffed meat dishes.

If you're planning to eat out in Genoa, be sure to note that many restaurants close on Sunday and Saturday at lunchtime, so, plan accordingly.

Airport



The Genoa City Airport (GOA), also known as the Christopher Columbus Airport or Aeroporto di Genova-Sestri Ponente, is situated roughly 7 km

away from the city centre.

A shuttle bus service is available every day from 5:20 am to 11:30 pm, providing transportation to and from the railway station. The journey takes approximately 30-40 minutes, and you can purchase a ticket on board that's valid for the entire day on all city buses, subways, lifts, and metropolitan trains.

Taxis can be easily found just outside the arrival terminal and are relatively inexpensive due to the airport's proximity to the city centre. #### Passport / Visa



Italy can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE and

most countries in America. If you are unsure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend contacting the embassy or consulate in your country. International (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip to enter the Schengen zone. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.

## **Public Transport**



Walking is the only form of transport possible in the historic centre of Genoa — the streets are too narrow for cars. However, Genoa boasts

an extensive bus system operated by a company called AMT, and the tickets are available for purchase at newsstands and valid for 90 minutes.

If you need to travel further afield, Genoa also has a single-line subway system marked by a red M that connects Rivaloro to the city centre and spans 8 stations. You can find ticket machines at all of the stations for your convenience.

In addition to the subway and buses, Genoa has lifts and funiculars to assist locals who live uphill. Standard AMT tickets can be used for these modes of transportation, and you can find several of them scattered throughout the city.


