## THE CITY

Weaving its way through the city, Bristol's revitalised harbour is lined with trendy bars, restaurants and cafés, many housed in converted warehouses – reminders of the city's rich maritime heritage. The waterfront offers inspirational art galleries, imaginative and futuristic visitor attractions such as Explore-At-Bristol, and two of Britain's most historic ships, Brunel's ss Great Britain and The Matthew. Visitors can take-in the fabulous sounds and sights of the harbourside with a hop-on-hop-off Bristol Ferry Boat trip providing a terrific way of transferring from one attraction to the next. Spanning away from the water's edge, winding streets lead to elegant parks and squares, historic buildings such as Bristol Cathedral, and other key attractions including the City Museum and Art Gallery. The stunning Georgian architecture of Clifton, with the iconic landmark of Brunel's Clifton Suspension Bridge, and one of the oldest zoos in the world – Bristol Zoo Gardens – are also very close by. You can see all that Bristol has to offer by climbing aboard a Bristol City Sightseeing Bus that will take you on a circular hop-on-hop-off tour. Out and about, Bristol offers a perfect base for exploring the wider region. The city is just 15 minutes by train from the world heritage city of Bath and the Somerset coast and countryside, and the Cotswolds are also within easy reach. Attractions are plentiful with historic Berkeley Castle, Avon Valley Railway, Cheddar Caves & Gorge, the Wildfowl and Wetlands Centre at Slimbridge, Tyntesfield Estate and the beauty of Westonbirt Arboretum all within a short drive of Bristol.

It takes 30 mins to get to Bristol International Airport ([www.bristolairport.co.uk](http://www.bristolairport.co.uk)) by train or bus. The train leaves every 20 mins from Bristol Temple Meads. The Bristol International Flyer bus runs every half an hour between Bristol Temple Meads, Bristol Bus station, Bedminster, Bridgewater Road and Bristol Airport. An adult single bus ticket costs £6, return £8. Tickets can be bought from the bus driver or booked online at [www.bristolairport.co.uk](http://www.bristolairport.co.uk).

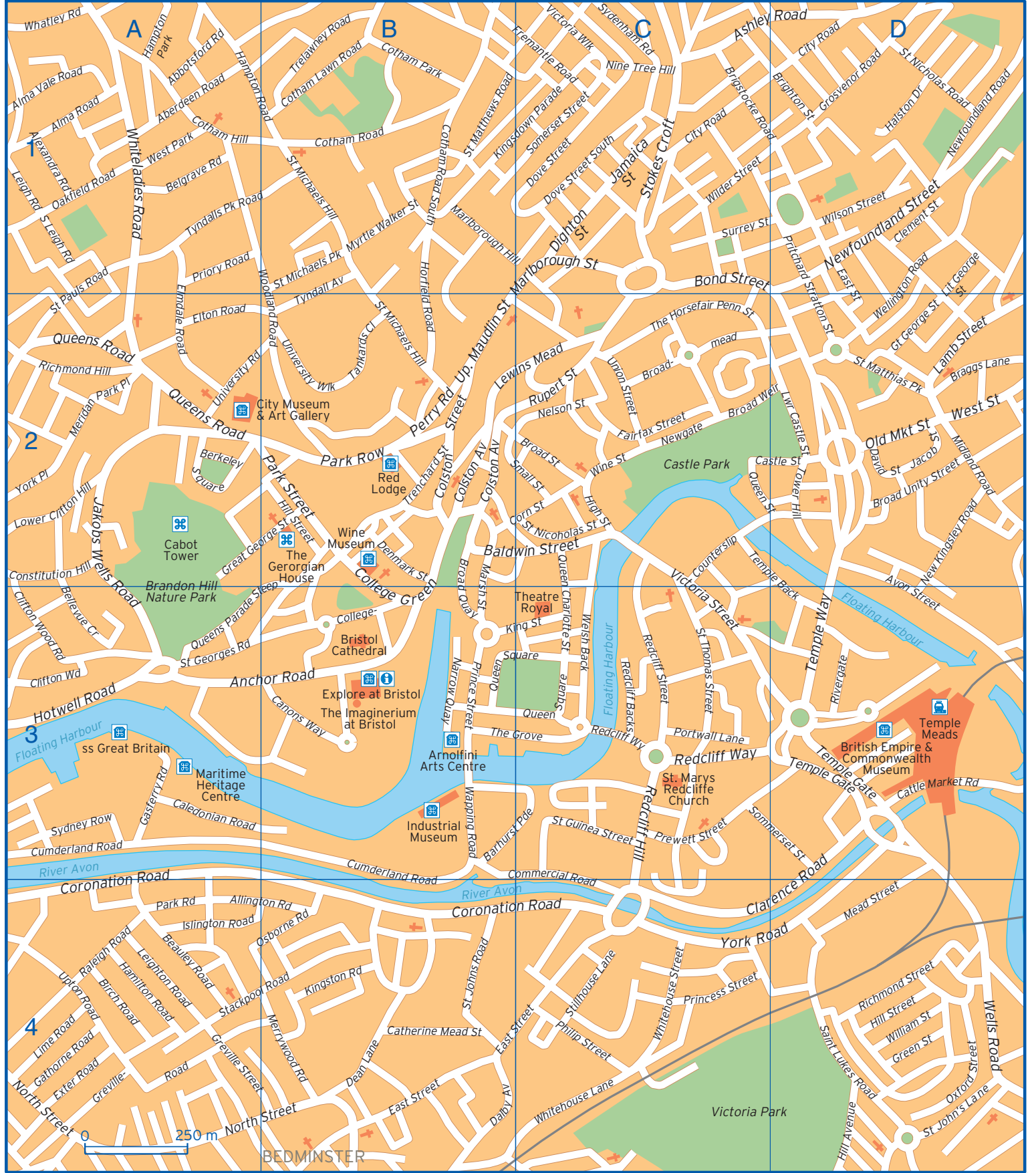
