THE CITY

Situated on both sides of the River Derwent with the imposing bulk of Mount Wellington dominating the skyline behind the city, Hobart is one of the most attractive places in Australia. The city is the second oldest city in Australia after Sydney, and was established as a penal settlement in 1803.

Hobart has one of the deepest harbours in Australia, and, although the port is well past its heyday as a major exporter of fruit and wool, the river is still active with many yachts and other pleasure crafts. In addition, Hobart is a starting point for Australian and International ships going to the Antarctic.

Around the harbour many of the fine old brick and sandstone buildings have been restored and converted into new uses including hotels, restaurants, art galleries and craft shops. Salamanca Place hosts a tantalising market every Saturday and behind that is Battery Point, the historic centre of the city.

Tasmania has developed a fine reputation for the production of wonderful fresh produce, fruit and vegetables and a burgeoning wine scene. The Tastes of Tasmania Festival held in Hobart around the New Year, is a showcase of this outstanding produce—the event coincides with the end of the annual Sydney to Hobart yacht race, so the harbour and city really come alive.

Constitution Dock

Colourful marina surrounded by many attractive heritage buildings. It comes alive at New Year when boats from the annual Sydney-Hobart yacht race moor there.

The Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race, also known as the "Bluewater Classic", is about 630 nautical miles (1,170 km). It is considered to be one of the most challenging yacht races in the world.

The Cascade Brewery is Australia's oldest operating brewery, established in 1824. It is located in the foothills of Mount Wellington, only a five minutes drive from Hobart. The brewery produces Tasmanian beers and soft drinks and there is a two hour brewery tour to see all aspects of the beer-making process. The main department stores are located in a small area in the city centre and include major chains like Myer as well as many smaller boutique shops. However, most visitors to Tasmania are attracted by the thriving arts and craft industry with many talented artisans producing works in wood (beautiful Huon pine, myrtle and sassafras), metal and wool.

Many fine galleries can be found—especially in Salamanca Place including Aspect Design, Handmark Gallery and the Wilderness Society Shop. Look out for

works by local artists, especially of the wonderful scenery of Tasmania. If you enjoy markets, then head for the Salamanca Market held every Saturday at the Salamanca Place.

After touring the market, why not browse the shops and boutiques in the Georgian sandstone warehouses bordering the stalls? Hobart also has some wonderful second-hand and antiquarian bookshops, antique shops, distilleries and wine outlets.
