

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### THE CITY

Copenhagen is an ancient city, full of beautiful historic buildings and many points of interest. The ramparts and walls surrounding the city centre were demolished around the middle of the nineteenth century. This allowed Copenhagen to assume the peculiar architectural structure characterised by narrow stone streets that lead directly to the city centre and which are the background to numerous shops and bars.

In recent years, Copenhagen's historic architectural heritage has been enriched with modern and contemporary buildings. An example of these are those designed by the Danish and French architects Bjarke Ingels and Jean Nouvel, who gave a new touch to the old-fashioned style of the city.

Copenhagen is also known for its relaxing atmosphere. Denmark's capital effortlessly captures the essence of 'hygge', a Danish term that encapsulates a sense of cosiness, comfort, and contentment. The city's charming streets, picturesque canals, and stylish yet welcoming spaces contribute to the overall hygge atmosphere. Locals and visitors alike savour moments of relaxation in cosy cafés, enjoy leisurely walks through parks, and appreciate the warm, convivial ambience of Copenhagen's many restaurants and bars.

### Inner City (Indre By)



The Inner City can be defined as the metropolis of Copenhagen, which encompasses the city's oldest district with pretty narrow streets and

original houses. The city centre is full of shops, bars, restaurants, parks, numerous canals and, of course, Nyhavn, the colourful harbour of Copenhagen. The main street of Inner City is Strøget, which goes from the town hall square to Kongens Nytorv. Strøget is always frequented by a myriad of street performers, but do not forget to take a trip to the pretty side streets like Frederiksberggade, Nygade and Vimmelskaftet.

#### **Østerbro**

Frederiksberg is also a green oasis with Frederiksberg Gardens, the romantic garden of the Faculty of Life Sciences and Søndermarken.

Copenhagen is often mentioned as one of the most environmentally conscious cities in Europe, if not the entire world. The Danish capital hopes to achieve carbon neutrality by 2025 and has already taken a number of steps toward this ambitious goal.

A notable stride in this direction involves the rapid transition of buses from diesel to electric power, delivering not only a positive impact on air quality but also a reduction in noise pollution. In addition, the city is prioritising the development of dedicated biking lanes to encourage sustainable transportation — subsidised prices for electric bikes are making the switch from cars even more attractive.

Copenhagen maintains a commitment to sustainability, with approximately two-thirds of its hotels being eco-certified. These certifications ensure the adoption of best practices in sustainable energy, food, and design.

Additionally, the city's dining scene aligns with eco-friendly principles, with many restaurants offering organic food options to conscientious consumers.

### **Green Bike Tours**



Green Bike Tours is a non-profit company that offers bike and walking tours in English with a focus on green and sustainable cities. Their

routes take you through different parts of Copenhagen via bike-friendly streets and bridges. You'll bike at a comfortable pace through the city centre and into the neighbourhoods of Vesterbro, Østerbro, Nørrebro and Islands Brygge.

On the 3-hour tour, you'll come across amazing hidden gems, urban gardens, wonderful green areas, cosy squares and recreative areas, plus solar installations, green roofs, harbour pools, green architecture, energy-efficient buildings and wind turbines.

### **Urban Gardens & Wild Nature**



Copenhagen boasts numerous parks and gardens that are perfect places to relax, sunbathe, have a picnic with friends or just read a book.

Copenhagen Municipality is driven by a nature-based urban development model, providing green spaces for humans as well as non-human animals. Instead of sterile green lawns, you'll see a jumble of wildflowers and herbs like Yarrow, Pulmonaria and Asters that are swarmed by eager insects.

The King's Garden is a popular spot for Copenhageners while Frederiksberg Gardens boasts lush open areas and canals. Explore the district of St. Kjeld's neighbourhood on Østerbro where wild plants and freshly harvested vegetables are a common sight. Additionally, some of Copenhagen's cemeteries are commonly used as green breathing spaces for leisurely walks.

Feel free to bring your own skiing and snowboarding equipment, or rent some from the local shop. The slope is open year-round since it does not rely on snow. If skiing is not your thing, how about climbing? The climbing wall at CopenHill is the world's tallest at 85 metres.

### Nyhavn



This iconic postcard-ready sight is somewhat of a sudden splash of colour and a definite must-visit when in town. The canal was

He wrote 'The Tinderbox', 'Little Claus and Big Claus' and 'The Princess and the Pea' while living at No 20, and also spent time living at Nos 18 and 67. The pièce de résistance is the basement Treasury, home to the dazzling crown jewels, among them Christian IV's glorious crown and Christian III's jewel-studded sword.

### The Little Mermaid



New York has its Lady Liberty and Sydney its Danish-designed Opera House. When the world thinks of Copenhagen, the chances are they're

thinking of the Little Mermaid. Love her or loathe her (watch Copenhageners cringe at the very mention of her), this small, underwhelming statue is arguably the most photographed sight in the country, as well as the cause of countless 'Is that it?' shrugs from tourists who have trudged the kilometre or so along an often windswept harbourfront to see her.

Whether locals like it or not, The Little Mermaid has become Copenhagen's most recognisable

symbol, and visiting to snap a quick shot is, certainly, worth the detour from the city's core. This commemoration of Andersen's genius is conveniently located right next to the historic fortress of Kastellet, so make sure to walk through the green star-shaped area on your way back.



### Børsen — The Old Stock Exchange

### **Royal Library**



Scandinavia's largest library consists of two very distinct parts: the original 19th-century red-brick building and the head-turning 'Black

Diamond' extension, the latter a leaning parallelogram of sleek black granite and smoke-coloured glass. From the soaring, harbour-fronting atrium, an escalator leads up to a 210 sq metre ceiling mural by celebrated Danish artist Per Kirkeby. ### Copenhagen Airport, Kastrup (CPH)



Copenhagen Airport,
Kastrup, is located just
eight kilometres from the
centre of the city. As the
largest and busiest
airport in Scandinavia, it

comprises three terminals, with international arrivals primarily processed in Terminal 3.

Various transportation options connect the airport to the city centre, ensuring a quick journey of about 15 to 35 minutes. Trains departing every ten minutes from Copenhagen Central Station offer a 15-minute commute, with convenient connections to the city and beyond via metro, train, S-train, or bus. The Metro operates around the clock, providing efficient travel to key locations, while buses offer a more economical but lengthier 35-minute ride to the central station. Taxis are available outside Terminal 3 but represent the priciest option.

Travellers holding a Copenhagen Card enjoy free, unlimited public transport within the entire capital region, covering trips to/from Copenhagen Airport. The card also grants free entry to over 80 attractions and museums, along with discounts at various establishments.

### **Public Transport**



Copenhagen boasts a reliable public transport system, with Metro, S-trains, and buses, including waterbuses, accessible using the same



ticket. All you need to know is how many zones you will pass on your journey, which will play a crucial role in determining the appropriate ticket.

All three metro lines operate 24/7 for seamless travel. The A-buses are the primary buses in central Copenhagen; they run consistently at all hours, while night buses (N buses) operate from 1am to 5am, identifiable by their grey bus stop signs. The bright red "S" trains connect suburbs and surrounding towns to the city, running from 5am to 12:30am.

Biking provides an excellent and popular means of navigating the city, allowing visitors and locals to easily explore its charming streets and attractions while enjoying the bicycle-friendly infrastructure.

Denmark can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE and

most countries in America. If you are unsure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend contacting the embassy or consulate in your country. International (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter the Schengen zone. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.
