
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
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THE ISLAND



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Known for its picturesque beaches, sheltered coves, limestone mountains, charming villages, and Roman and Moorish remains, the largest of the Balearic Islands, Mallorca, boasts scenery that is as diverse as it is ravishing.

Its capital Palma de Mallorca — or simply, Palma — is a vibrant, bustling city, rich in history, culture, and impressive architecture. The imposing La Seu Cathedral is its standout feature.

A mere 20 minutes away, in the mountains to the northwest, is the sensationally beautiful Valldemossa — a village that composer Frederic Chopin once called home. A further 10 minutes away is the village of Deià, the former home of poet Robert Graves.

Southeast of Palma, you can find picturesque fishing idylls and magnificent fjord-like bays near the village of Portopetro. A slice of the West Indies in Mallorca — the vast beach of Es Trenc — lies a few miles to the west.

Head north towards Capdepera to be amazed by the medieval castle built over a crumbled city wall. Golden sandy beaches are flanked by lofty mountains straight out of a fantasy film. The golf courses here gleam, and the sea is its deepest

turquoise.

Every corner of this island hides forts, monasteries, beautiful beaches, treasures, myths and legends waiting to be discovered.

Coves del Drac



Coves del Drac (Cuevas del Drach/Dragon Caves) is a unique network of caves situated in an old fishing village called Porto Cristo, around 65

kilometres from Palma. Go underground and visit this impressive complex boasting thousands upon thousands of stalagmites, stalactites as well as a stunning underground lake. Sa Dragonera National Park



Home to salamanders, geckos, among other lizards, this wild, uninhabited, dragon-shaped islet off the dramatic southwest

Castell d'Alaró



Perched on the rocky edge of Mallora, Castell d'Alaro is one of the island's most rewarding climbs — recommended by lovers of both history

and nature. These ruins, a crumbling castle, several arched stone doors, and wall remnants are all that remains of what was once the fortress of 9th-century Christian warriors. Less adventurous visitors may drive to the ascent to take in the stunning views over almost the entire island.

In case you want to stay overnight, Castell d'Alaró also functions as a guesthouse. There's also a small bar and restaurant where you can recharge your batteries and enjoy a meal with fantastic views.

La Seu Cathedral



This imposing 14th-century Gothic cathedral stands tall atop the old Roman and Renaissance city walls, looking out over Palma's

harbour and old town. It was built over hundreds of years on the ruins of the mosque that once stood there. Famous Catalan architect Antoni Gaudí had a hand in the restoration project early in the 20th century, though he quit the project over a dispute with the contractor. This beautiful architectural wonder offers breathtaking views in every direction and is the perfect starting point for a walking tour through the city.

Carthusian Monastery of Valldemossa



High mountains and deep valleys frame Valldemossa, the village where the island's first two "celebrity tourists" composer Frederic

Chopin and authoress George Sand — lived in 1838.

Once here, make sure to visit the village's main attraction: The Carthusian Monastery of Valldemossa. Originally built as a royal palace in 1309 and later converted into a monastery of the Carthusian order, the Carthusian Monastery of Valldemossa is an impressive complex that houses a palace, a church, an old pharmacy, an art collection of some of the greatest modern Spanish and local artists, and the cells where the monks lived for 400 years to find peace and rest. Each cell has its own exit to the garden terrace with blossoming magnolias and a wonderful view over the valley.

Soller



The inhabitants of this idyllic village lived for centuries hidden in a valley behind a huge row of mountains. It was so hard to climb the

mountain chain that people preferred to go to Palma by boat. And if they were on a boat anyway, why not go to France? Soller became tri-lingual — Mallorcan, Spanish, and French. In 1911, a tunnel was dug through the mountains so that the people of Soller could finally have better access to their own island. The town's charming little train still runs today. The ride from Palma to Sóller lasts about an hour, and it offers beautiful mountain views.

As is to be expected, tapas, montaditos, and pintxos abound in Mallorca. Passport/Visa



Spain can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE,

and most countries in America. If you are unsure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend contacting the embassy or consulate in your country. International (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter the Schengen zone. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.

service on Mallorca is excellent. Depending on how much you plan to travel, there is a selection of different types of tickets, and you can buy these at the Intermodal Station on Plaça d'Espanya in Palma or at tobacconists. Urban Bus number 3 in Palma goes all the way from the industrial area via Palma's town centre to the Illetas beach.

Public transport buses to Valldemossa and other popular villages leave from the bus station behind Plaza España.




