



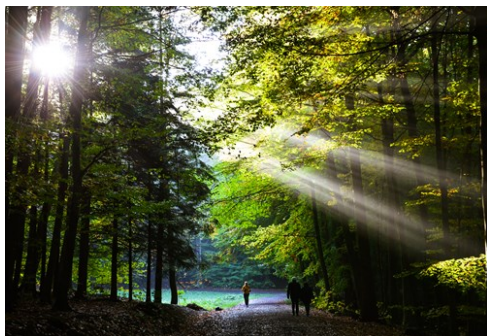

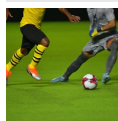

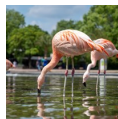
Located in the North Rhine-Westphalia region of the country, modern Dortmund is vibrant and cultural, known for its good shopping, beer and football. But there is another, altogether gentler, side to this former industrial powerhouse. Dortmund has great theatres and cultural centres, a range of fascinating museums and, with half the city given over to parks and gardens, enough green areas to sooth the senses.

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THE CITY

In the 19th century Dortmund was a smoky, sweaty and extremely prosperous city. The industrial revolution brought mines, mills and manufacturing, as well as jobs by the thousands. Within a century, the population grew from a paltry 4,000 to a staggering 140,000, making Dortmund the largest city in the Ruhr region. The Second World War devastated much of the city — around 70 percent of the buildings were flattened — and the 1950s saw an intense period of rebuilding.

Much of what you see in Dortmund today was built in the last 50 years. The plants, mines and steel plants have turned into funky museums, while Dortmund's citizens work in the city's burgeoning IT, insurance and services industries. As for leisure time, Germans flock to Dortmund for the excellent shopping and the city has good restaurants, bars and theatres; cabaret being a particular speciality, including a superb purpose-built concert hall.

Museum of Art & Cultural History (MKK)



The Museum of Art and Cultural History is a delight for every history, art and design enthusiast. The museum takes you step by step through the centuries and shows paintings, furniture, handcrafts and all sorts of collections from the dawn of time until the 21st century.

You can even feel the historical importance of the museum itself when you stroll and gaze in awe with all the artifacts. The museum was formerly a deposit bank, built in 1923.

A bit of advice, Hoppy's Treff explicitly states that you shouldn't show up in a Schalke shirt, otherwise you might be mocked through the entire night.

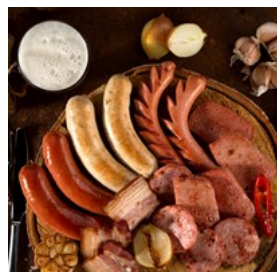

Dortmund Airport (DTM)



Dortmund's airport is located 13 kilometres east of the city at Flughafenring 11. There are regular bus services running between the

airport and the city bus station, located opposite the main train station. The journey time is around 25 minutes. The first bus from Dortmund departs at 4:30am; the last bus departs at 10pm. A current bus timetable can be downloaded from the airport website. Look for 'airport express'. The airport shuttle refers to the connection with the local railway station.

An alternative, but slower route is to take the city bus 440 at the airport and then change at Aplerbeck station for the U47 metro.

There is also a 5-minute bus shuttle service connecting the airport with the local railway station, Holzwickede. From here you can catch a regular train into Dortmund. Trains run approximately every hour. The buses run at 15-20 minute intervals. Children under 6 can travel free of charge.

Taxis take around 15 minutes for the journey to and back from the airport.

Dortmund can also be reached via airports in nearby large cities such as Cologne and Dusseldorf.

Passport & Visa



Citizens of European Union (EU) and European Economic Area (EEA) countries do not need a visa to enter Germany, only a valid ID. Many other countries, including the United Kingdom, United States, Canada, United Arab Emirates, Australia, and New Zealand, benefit from visa-free entry for short stays of up to 90 days within a 180-day period.

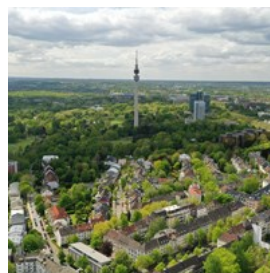
Visitors from visa-exempt countries must hold a valid passport and, starting in late 2025, will need to apply for an ETIAS (European Travel Information and Authorisation System) authorisation online before travelling.

For those requiring a visa, such as travellers from some Middle-East, African or Asian nations, a Schengen visa must be obtained prior to arrival. All travellers should ensure their passport is valid for at least three months beyond their intended stay.

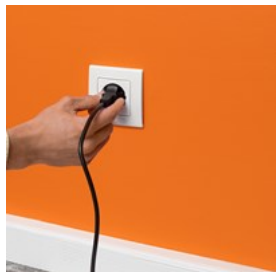

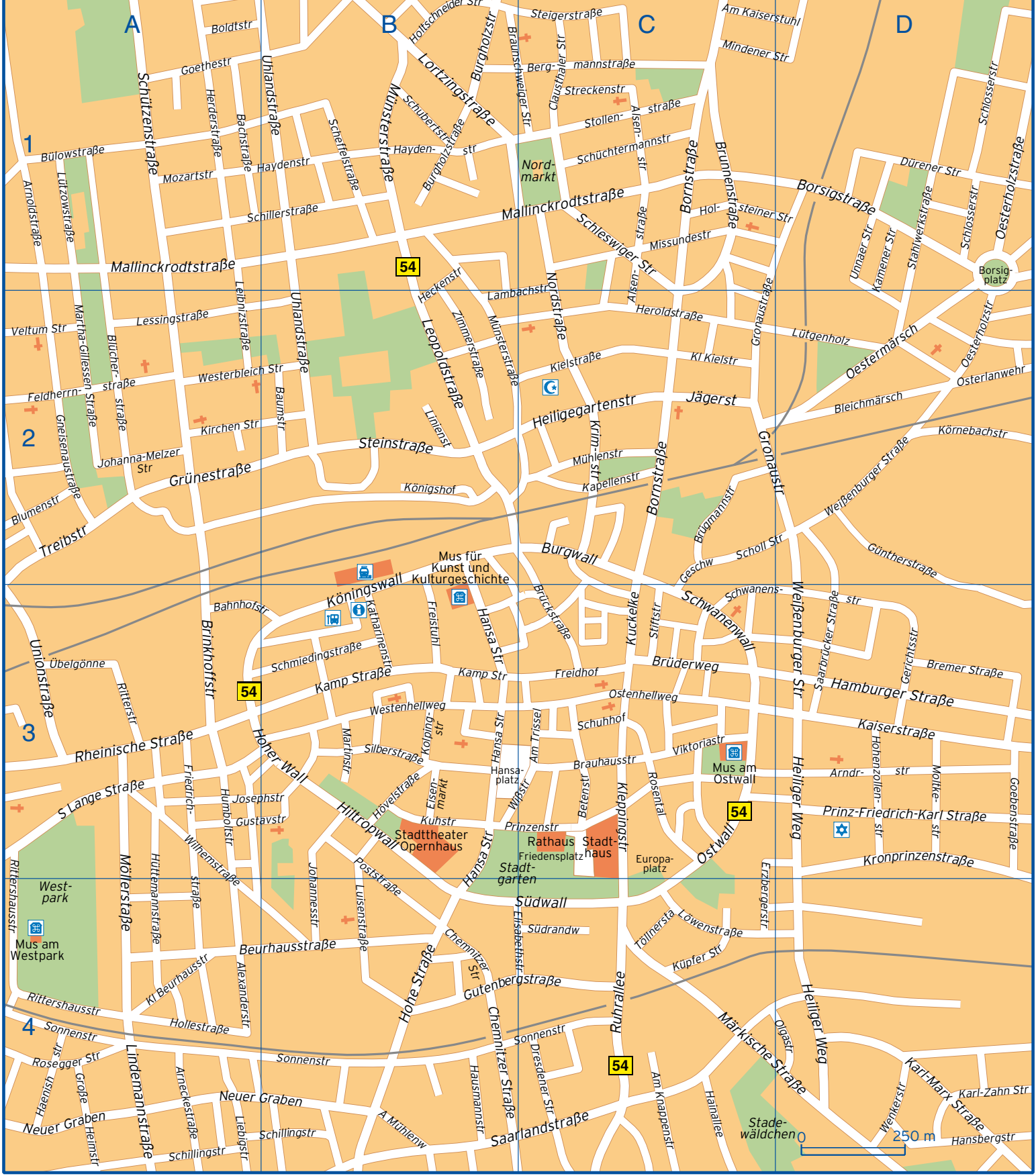
