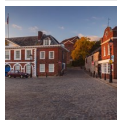

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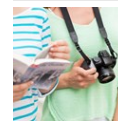

THE CITY

Frequently voted one of the best British cities to live in, Exeter certainly breathes an atmosphere of sophistication, culture and charm with this very old city kept young at heart by the large student population attending the University of Exeter. Exeter's history and prosperity began with the arrival of the Romans, whose most obvious legacy is the almost completely intact red stone defensive wall that surrounds the city centre. Today, the manageable city and compact central district showcases centuries of different architectural styles with much of its well preserved medieval layout, offering tantalising opportunities to amble among narrow cobbled streets and discover tucked-away unique independent shops, bars and cafés. Located in the heart of the city and enclosed on two sides by some fine buildings, Exeter's Cathedral Church of St Peter dominates the skyline and its surrounding lawns, while terraced cafés and upmarket shops make for a popular meeting point on fine sunny days. A 10 minute walk south beyond the ancient city walls leads to the Historic Quayside on the banks of the River Exe. Once an important trading port, this is now a fascinating waterfront attraction featuring all manner of places to eat, drink and shop all housed within the former historic port buildings along the Quayside.

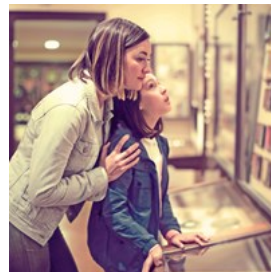

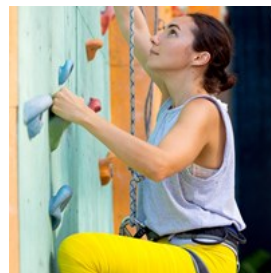

Quay climbing Centre



The Quay Climbing Centre is the South West's largest indoor climbing wall. The centre makes use of the huge atrium space built into

one of Exeter's largest and iconic industrial buildings - formerly the city's electricity works. Within the arena there are 85 hangers each with up to 3 lines of climbing making for well over 200 routes to try at any time. There's a 14.5 metre lead wall, top roped walls from 7 to 11 metres, 5 auto belays for solo climbers and a dedicated novice zone as well as two boulder caves and training room. The Workshop Café offers a daily menu of home cooked food.

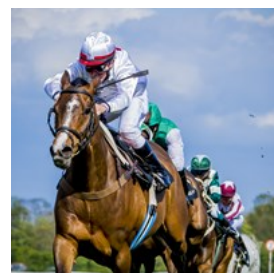

Cockington Village and Cockington Court



Many villages lay claim to being 'picturesque', but the village of Cockington is the real deal. Take a walk back in time along Cockington's narrow

lanes, lined with thatched houses and you'll experience a quiet charm that is quintessentially English. Everything about Cockington oozes with history - there's a water mill, a forge and even the cricket pitch was once a medieval deer park. It seems like a little, cute and human Hobbiton!

At the heart of the village is Cockington Court, a manor house with roots in medieval times, surrounded by hundreds of acres of gorgeous country park.

Today, Cockington Court is a hub for art and crafts and in the brand new contemporary craft centre you'll find a canoe maker and a chocolate maker, and you can watch glassblowers and blacksmiths in action.

Cockington Court has a full programme of events including open-air theatre, Cockington Fayre, Cockington Apple Day and the ever-popular Cockington Christmas Fayre as well as regular art and craft exhibitions. Check their events calendar before your visit.

Burgh Island



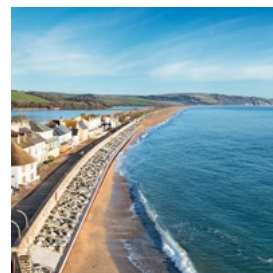
Burgh Island, situated directly opposite Bigbury on Sea, is steeped in history and legend, being a one-time haunt of pirates and smugglers,

Slapton Sands



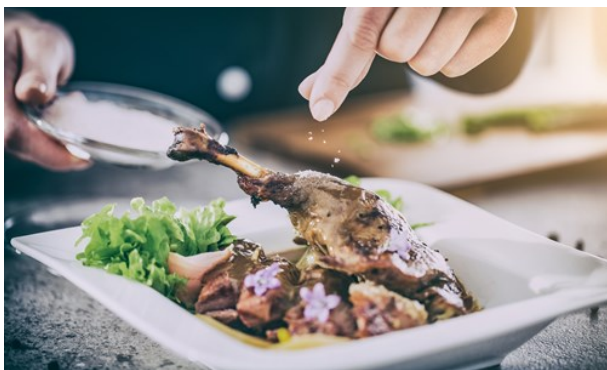
These are two halves of a 3 mile sand and shingle bar stretching between Strete in the north and Torcross in the south. At the Torcross end, the bar

Passport & Visa



For travel to the UK, citizens of the EU, EEA, and Switzerland (except Irish citizens) need an Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA).

However, those planning to work or study in the UK for more than six months will need to obtain the appropriate visa. Additionally, residents of nine other countries — including Australia, Canada, Hong Kong, Japan, Malaysia, New

Zealand, Singapore, South Korea, and the United States — can also visit the UK for up to six months without a visa, but they will still need an ETA. To ensure a smooth journey, it is advisable to consult the UK government website for any specific visa requirements or regulations.

The bus connecting the airport and the city centre is called Stagecoach. The quickest route by bus to and from the city centre bus station is to take the 56 (56A 56B), which operate 6 days a week (Limited route on Sundays and Bank Holidays). The journey time is approximately 25 minutes.

The airport's only authorised taxi company, Apple Central Taxis, operates from the taxi stand outside the Arrivals building. You can pre-book by telephone or in person at the Taxi Desk.

There are some approved car hire operators at the airport such as Hertz, Budget and Europcar.
