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## THE ISLAND

Ibiza is one of Europe's most beautiful islands—and definitely one of its liveliest. With just over 100,000 permanent residents, the island welcomes more than 4 million visitors every year. Locals call it 'Eivissa', the official Catalan name. Throughout its long history, Ibiza has seen a range of cultures come and go—from the Phoenicians and Carthaginians to the Greeks, Moors, and Catalans—each leaving their mark on the island's unique heritage and culture.

By the 1960s, the island had become a haven for hippies, who turned it into a counterculture hotspot. These days, Ibiza still wears those influences proudly, with a salt industry that's been around for 2,000 years, old smugglers' routes, a hippie market, and the charming old town. Today, it's a melting pot of cultures, and you can see that in the food scene, where you'll find everything from local Spanish tapas to international cuisine, and in the bars and clubs that blend sleek designs with stunning coastal views.

## BEACH LIFE

Cala Comte is on the west coast and has a mix of small coves, clear turquoise water, and rocky outcrops—great for swimming or snorkelling.

There are a couple of beach bars with decent food and music. The vibe is relaxed, but you'll still find plenty of energy around.

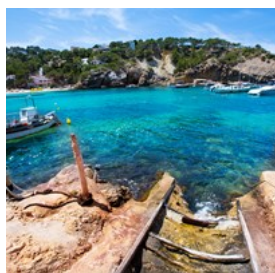
### Cala Mastella

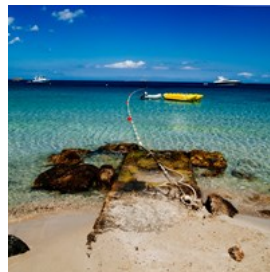
### Cala Vadella

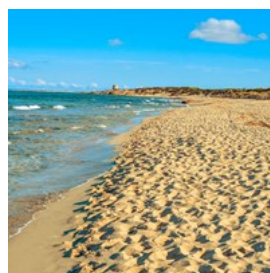
### Platja d'en Bossa

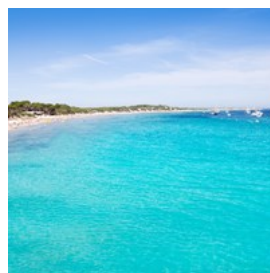
### Platja des Cavallet



Platja des Cavallet is known as Ibiza's official nudist beach, but it draws a pretty mixed crowd these days. It's long, windswept, and backed by sand dunes, with space to spread out. There are a few beach bars, and the southern end has been a longtime favourite with the LGBTQ+ community. It's also a good spot for windsurfing when the breeze picks up.

### Cala d'en Serra



Cala d'en Serra is a small, quiet cove up in the north, surrounded by steep cliffs and pine trees. The water's clear, the sand is soft, and it

feels a bit off the radar—even in summer, it's usually not too crowded. An old, unfinished hotel looms above the beach—locals joke it's been 'under construction' since the '70s. Bring what you need, though—there's not much in the way of facilities.

Ibiza offers a diverse range of activities beyond its renowned nightlife. Spend a day exploring the island by bike or car, wandering through the narrow streets of Dalt Vila, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Visit one of the island's hippy markets, such as the Punta Arabí Hippy Market in Es Canar. For water enthusiasts, there are ample opportunities for kayaking, paddleboarding, snorkelling, and scuba diving in the clear Mediterranean waters. Additionally, the nearby island of Formentera is accessible via a short ferry ride, offering pristine beaches and a relaxed atmosphere.

### Dalt Vila



Ibiza's old town, Dalt Vila, sits behind thick 16th-century stone walls built to keep pirates and invaders out. It's now a UNESCO World Heritage

site, and wandering its narrow, cobbled streets feels like stepping into another time. Climb up to the cathedral at the top for wide views over the harbour and sea, or enter through the impressive main gate—Portal de ses Taules—just near the old market. The place has a history in every corner, but it's also full of quiet spots, galleries, and the occasional bar tucked away in the side streets.

### Castle of Ibiza



The Castell d'Eivissa, or Ibiza Castle, crowns the summit of Dalt Vila, Ibiza's historic old town. This fortress is a complex of structures reflecting centuries of architectural evolution. Key components include the Moorish-era Tower of Homage, the 8th-century Almudaina keep, the Governor's House, and 18th-century infantry barracks. The castle's strategic position offers commanding views of the surrounding area.

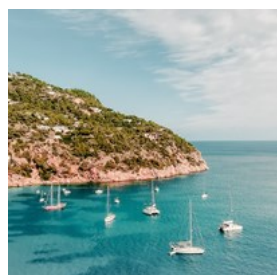
While the castle's interior isn't fully open to visitors, exploring its exterior and the surrounding area offers a rewarding experience. The climb up through Dalt Vila's winding streets leads to stunning panoramic views of Ibiza Town and the sea.

### Ibiza Beach Hopping Cruise



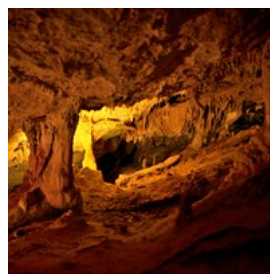
Spend an unforgettable day aboard a double-decker glass-bottomed catamaran and experience Ibiza's natural wonders on this fun five-hour cruise.

### Can Marça Cave



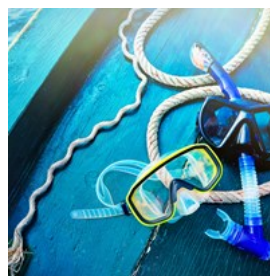
Once used by smugglers moving tobacco and alcohol along the coast, this cave in the cliffs of Puerto de San Miguel is now open for guided tours. Inside, you'll find stalactites, stalagmites, and a recreated waterfall that gives you an idea of what the original underground water flow looked like. As you descend, the path winds through the cave with views out to sea. Tours run hourly from 10:30 until sunset, year-round.

### Diving



Ibiza's warm, clear waters are great for diving, whether you're a beginner or looking for something more advanced. Around the island you'll find everything from shallow reefs and underwater caves to shipwrecks. Some of the best spots include the Don Pedro wreck near Ibiza Town and the cave systems off Cala Llonga. Diving schools are easy to find near most major beaches, and many offer PADI courses if you're looking to get certified while you're here.

### Ibiza Cathedral (Catedral de Santa María de las Nieves)



Perched atop Dalt Vila, Ibiza's historic old town, the cathedral offers panoramic views over the city and sea. Originally built in the 14th century on the site of a former mosque, it showcases a blend of architectural styles: a Gothic bell tower and a Baroque nave with 14 side chapels. Inside, the Diocesan Museum houses religious art and artefacts spanning from the 14th to the 20th centuries.

### Formentera Island



Just a short ferry from Ibiza, Formentera feels slower, smaller, and more stripped-back. Most people come for the beaches—Illetes, Llevant, and Cala Saona are the best known, with pale sand and ridiculously clear water. From the port of La Savina, you can rent a bike, scooter or car to explore the rest of the island. A quick stop at the tourist office will get you a free map. If you're into history, check out the Ca Na Costa megalithic site. For a proper view, head up to Es Mirador for lunch or a drink.

What started in the 1970s as a small gathering of artists and travellers has grown into the biggest market on the island. Held every Wednesday in Es Canar, it's packed with stalls selling handmade jewellery, clothes, leather goods, and crafts. It gets busy, but that's part of the vibe—music, food stalls, and plenty of colour. Worth a wander, even if you're not looking to buy anything.

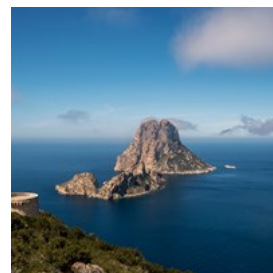

### Es Vedrà Island



Just off Ibiza's southwest coast, Es Vedrà is a dramatic uninhabited rock island rising out of the sea. You can't actually set foot on it—it's part of a protected nature reserve—but people come from all over to watch the sunset from the cliffs above Cala d'Hort or take boat trips around it. Locals talk about magnetic energy and odd compass readings, and some swear the island has healing properties or spiritual pull. Myths range from sirens and sea nymphs to Atlantis connections—take your pick.

### Puig de Missa Church (Església Santa Eulària del Riu)



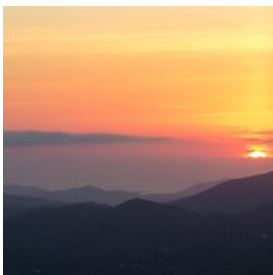
This fortified hilltop church in Santa Eulària isn't just a peaceful spot—it's also one of the best viewpoints on the island. The walk-up winds through whitewashed houses and quiet lanes, with views opening up the higher you go. Try to go early or later in the day—it gets hot, and there's not much shade. The church itself dates back to the 16th century and was built to double as a lookout and refuge from pirate raids.

### Sa Talaiassa Mountain

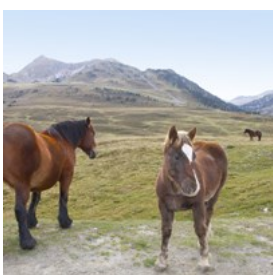


The highest point on the island, Sa Talaiassa (which means "The Watchtower" in Catalan), sits above the village of Sant Josep. You can drive

most of the way up or hike a 2.5 km trail to the summit. On clear days, the views stretch across the island and out to sea. It's quiet up there and a good spot to get a sense of Ibiza beyond the beach clubs.

### Ibiza Horse Valley



Tucked away in a remote valley in the north of the island, this sanctuary gives rescued horses a second chance. The team here takes in animals that

have been neglected or abused and helps them

recover in a natural environment. Visitors can join guided rides through the forested hills or even swim with the horses in the sea, depending on the weather and group.

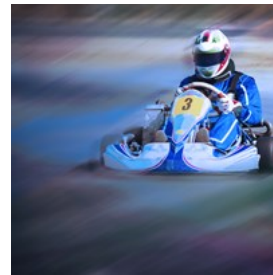

Ibiza's culture and history are reflected in the island's culinary heritage. The cuisine is strongly influenced by different Mediterranean cultures, particularly by the cuisine of Catalonia. Fresh fish and seafood dominate the island's culinary culture. However, Ibiza's restaurants cater to all kinds of gastronomic preferences.

### The Boat House



The Boat House is a breezy, toes-in-the-sand kind of place right on the beach at Cala Sant Vicent. It's got a laid-back, nautical feel with driftwood furniture, hammocks, and bits of fishing gear as decor. The menu's a bit of a global mix: Mediterranean small plates, fresh-off-the-boat seafood, a few Asian-inspired dishes, and plenty for veggies too.

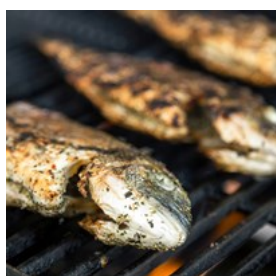

### El Bigotes



El Bigotes is a no-frills restaurant tucked near Cala Mastella, famous for serving one thing: the owner's morning catch, cooked over a wood fire into a traditional Ibizan fish stew called bullit de peix. It's served in two rounds—first the fish and potatoes, then rice made with the leftover broth. No menu, no choices, and no chance of getting in without a reservation—word is the king of Spain once got turned away for not booking ahead.

### Las dos Lunas



Las dos Lunas has been around since the early '80s and still feels like one of those places that knows exactly what it's doing. The menu leans Italian with Mediterranean touches and most of it's made from scratch, including the bread they bake in a wood-fired oven. The outdoor dining area feels more like a private courtyard than a restaurant—colourful tiles, vines spilling over stone walls, bougainvillea everywhere, and warm lighting that somehow makes even a Tuesday night feel like an event. It's close to San Rafael, just off the road, but once you're inside, it's like someone flipped the switch on the outside world. Book ahead if you want a table during the season—it fills up fast.

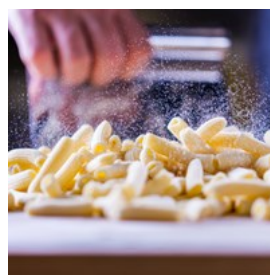

### BARS & NIGHTLIFE

Ibiza's bars set the scene for the incredible nightlife to come. Drinks are a little cheaper here than in the clubs, and most bars (unlike clubs) have free entry. There are club ticket deals and sometimes promotional offers on free chupitos (shots).

Party-goers and DJs come to Ibiza from all over the world to party all night long. It is, unarguably, one of the most incredible clubbing

experiences in the world.

The main party season runs from June to September, when the island's at full throttle.

### Amnesia



One of Ibiza's longest-running clubs and still a local favourite, Amnesia pulls huge crowds all summer, especially for its marathon closing parties in September. The sound system is serious, the ice cannons are ridiculous, and the energy stays high until way past sunrise. Big-name DJs, themed nights, and a split-level layout with two massive rooms make it feel like two clubs in one. If you're looking for the full-scale Ibiza clubbing experience, this is it.

### Ibiza Boat Party

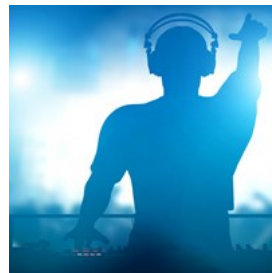

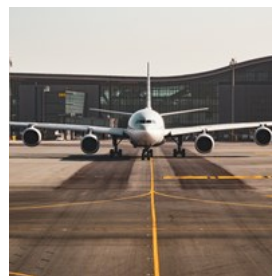

### Ibiza Airport (IBZ)

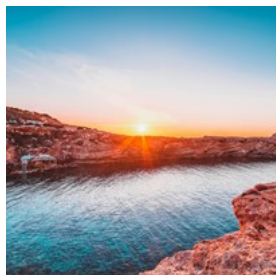


Ibiza Airport (IBZ) is located about 7 kilometres southwest of Ibiza Town, with a typical drive taking 10-15 minutes, depending on traffic. Travellers have several transport options to reach the city centre: the L10 bus runs every

20-30 minutes and gets you to the city in about 25 minutes for a few euros. Taxis are readily available outside the terminal.

### Best Time to Visit



The best time to visit Ibiza depends on what you're after. The party season kicks off in early May and runs through to late September, with some clubs starting as early as April and closing in early October. July and August are the hottest and busiest months—great if you're into packed beach clubs and all-night parties. For something a little more relaxed, June and September are ideal: the weather's still warm, the sea's perfect for swimming, and the crowds are thinner.

### Passport/Visa



Citizens of the European Union (EU) and European Economic Area (EEA) countries do not need a visa to enter Spain, only a valid ID. Many other countries, including the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, the United Arab Emirates, Australia, and New Zealand, benefit from visa-free entry for short stays of up to 90 days within a 180-day period.

Visitors from visa-exempt countries must hold a valid passport and, starting in late 2025, will need to apply for an ETIAS (European Travel

Information and Authorisation System) authorisation online before travelling.

For those requiring a visa, such as travellers from some Middle Eastern, African or Asian nations, a Schengen visa must be obtained prior to arrival. All travellers should ensure their passport is valid for at least three months beyond their intended stay.

### Public Transport



Public transport in Ibiza is limited to buses, which connect major towns like Ibiza Town, San Antonio, and Santa Eulalia, as well as many beaches, making it a practical option for tourists. During the summer months, Ibiza operates the Disco Bus, a night bus service connecting major clubs and resorts. The service typically runs from midnight until 6:30am, with buses departing every 30 to 45 minutes.

Water taxis also run between coastal spots such as San Antonio, Cala Bassa, and Cala Conta, offering a scenic alternative. For frequent travellers, the T-20 saver ticket provides discounted fares on multiple journeys.

## Post



Post offices in Ibiza, operated by Correos, generally open from 8:30am to 2:30pm on weekdays, though hours can vary by location. The main post office in Ibiza Town is conveniently situated at Avinguda d'Isidor Macabich, 67, making it easily accessible for travellers. Services include sending and receiving letters and parcels, purchasing stamps, and handling international shipments. Some branches also offer additional services like money transfers. For basic postal needs, stamps are also available at tobacconists (estancos), identifiable by their brown and yellow 'Tabacs' signs.
