THE CITY

If you are looking for life in the archipelagos, painted, wooden horses from Dalarna or hot nightclubs, you have driven about 1,000 kilometres too far. Here, in Swedish Lapland, things tend toward the extreme — they are magnificent and dramatic. Kiruna is the city of one hundred days with no night, and the midnight sun attracts tourists from all over the world. In the winter, when the temperature sometimes gets down below -35 degrees, ice, snow, darkness and cold reign supreme. Visitors venture out on dog sledding tours among spruce trees weighed down by snow while the northern lights blaze in the heavens.

Wild nature is open 24 hours a day, year round, thanks to the unique Swedish legal right to common land. Kiruna is surrounded by an untouched mountainous landscape, including Sweden's highest peak, Kebnekaise, and more than 6,000 lakes and seven large, unspoiled rivers. In addition to that, there are seven national parks: everything from high alpine terrain with glaciers and windswept tundra to swampy ground and forests of mountain birch extending for miles after miles. Lapland is an amusement park for lovers of the outdoors. And it is enormous — larger than Denmark and Holland put together. Even for an average Swede, used to long journeys, the distances and

barrenness of Lapland are something spoken about with respect, enchantment and a certain terror.

Kiruna, excellent as a base for trips in Lapland and Norrbotten, is a 100 years old, built beside the largest underground iron ore mine in the world. The lode of ore is four kilometres long and the mine is a kilometre deep. Some twenty kilometres northeast of Kiruna, in Jukkasjärvi, is the world-famous ice hotel and farther to the northwest is Riksgränsen, one of the country's leading ski resorts.

A tip: If you are visiting Kiruna in the winter, ask for advice on how you should dress. It is possible to enjoy yourself in severe cold, too, provided that you are dressed for it. If you are visiting Kiruna in the summer, don't forget the mosquito repellent!

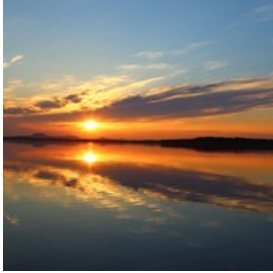

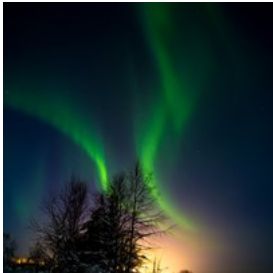
Midnight Sun



If you have never been in Northern Scandinavia during the midsummer period, the bright nights are perhaps the most fascinating and apparent phenomenon. The sun doesn't set at all. You can get spectacular views of the surroundings from the city mountain, Luossavaara, about 4 km outside Kiruna. The midnight sun can be experienced between 27 May and 14 July in Kiruna.

Northern Lights



Between September and April, there is the chance of experiencing the northern lights, provided that it is a starry night. The aurora borealis, or Northern Lights, is a stunning natural light display in the Earth's sky, caused by solar winds disturbing the magnetosphere and ionizing atmospheric particles.

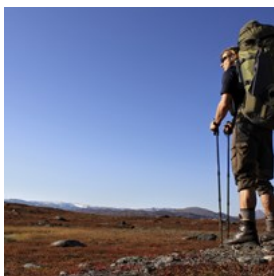

Kungleden — The Royal Trail



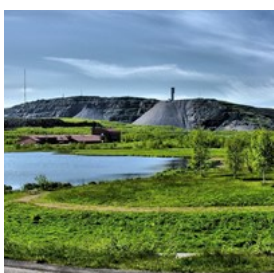
The famous long-distance hiking trail offers spectacular vistas of the natural world. It's 467 km long and starts in Abisko, 93 km northwest of

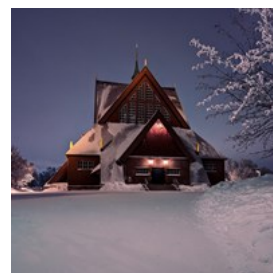

Kiruna Church, a remarkable example of Sweden's largest wooden structures, blends Gothic Revival architecture with an Art Nouveau altar.

Designed by Gustaf Wickman and completed in 1912, its unique shape mirrors a Sami hut (lavvú), with coloured glass lower windows and

clear upper ones. Dubbed the "sanctuary of the wandering people", it was envisioned as an inclusive space with minimal Christian symbols. Amidst Kiruna's transformation, this architectural gem is set for relocation in 2025, preserving its historic and cultural significance.

Kiruna Airport (KRN)



Kiruna airport is located 10 kilometres from the city centre and the journey time is about 15 minutes. Airport buses are only available at

certain times of the year, mainly in the summer period.

The airport coach connects the airport to Malmvägen in Kiruna. Norrbottens länstrafik runs a bus #91 between Kiruna and Riksgränsen. Passport/Visa



Sweden can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of most European countries, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea,

Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE and most countries in America. If you are unsure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend contacting the embassy or consulate in your country. International (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter the Schengen zone. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport, but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.

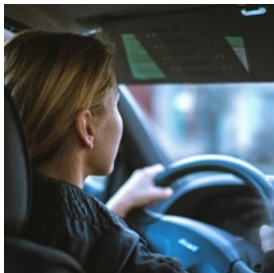
Public Transport

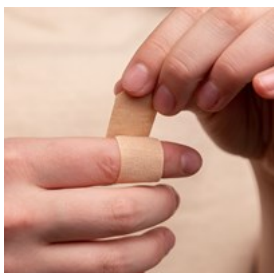

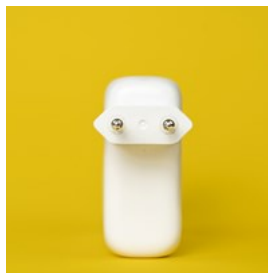

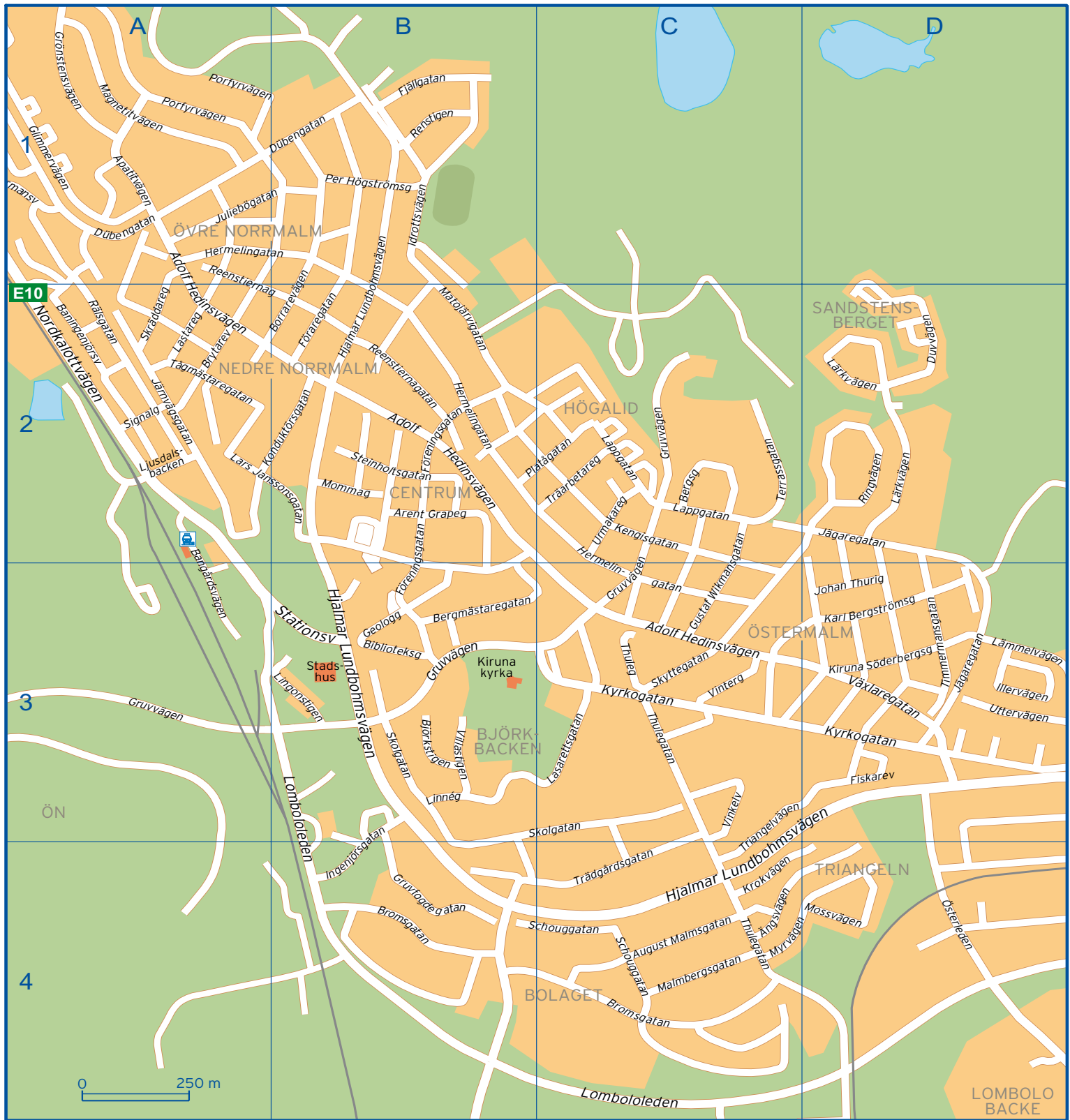
