Nestled in the corner of rural south-west France stands Pau, the capital of the Béarn province, a bastion of history and culture. The town occupies a unique geographical position in the foothills of the Pyrenées. With its awe-inspiring views of the mountain range, Pau is only a few hundred kilometres from the major towns of Bordeaux and Toulouse and even closer to Spain and the Atlantic Ocean. In short, a springboard to sunny beaches and snow-capped mountains.

THE CITY

Pau is a versatile city, and most sights are located just a short funicular ride away from the train station. Set on a hillside, you will find a majestic château, the former residence of Henri IV, the first Protestant king of France.

The town's iconic street, the Boulevard des Pyrénées, offers beautiful views adorned by palm trees, mountains, and the national park surrounding it. Behind 'the strip' there are busy little streets shooting off and converging around the main squares and central areas of Place Clémenceau and Place Royal. Everything is easily accessible from the boulevard, whether it's the bars lining it, the boutiques and clothes shops behind it, or the Centre Bosquet a few minutes' walk away.

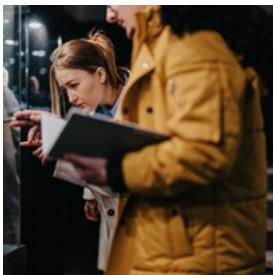

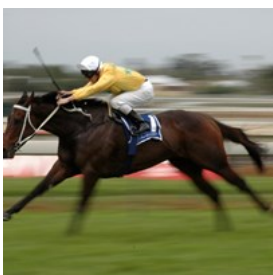

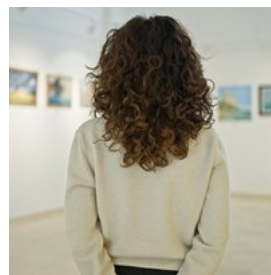

Skiing in the Pyrenees



The Pyrenees ski resorts are easily accessible from Pau, if you want to go on a ski holiday. The Pyrenees are more affordable than the Alps when it comes to passes and hire. You can reach the different destinations easily by buses and shuttles.

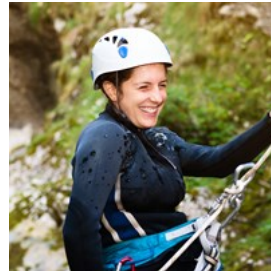

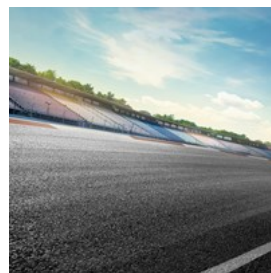

Pau and the Béarn area are famed for their cuisine. As with other parts of south-west France, it is the duck that dominates local dishes. Some specialties in Pau include foie gras, tender slices of duck breast: magret de canard, cured ham: jambon de Bayonne and creamy mountain sheep cheeses. The Palois like a good stew as well, often a garbure béarnaise, with potatoes, white beans, and, of course, duck. Poule au pot, a whole chicken cooked in a pot with onions, potatoes and wine, is also popular, and is washed down with a dry Jurançon wine.

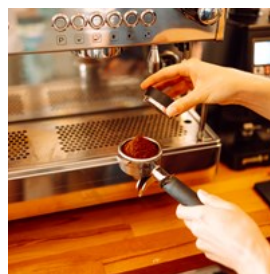

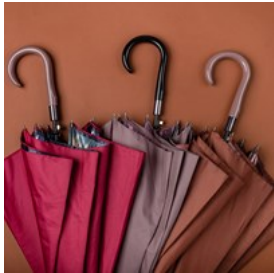
Pau's main shopping area is concentrated behind the symbolic Boulevard des Pyrénées. The Place Clémenceau has some stylish boutiques and similar shops can be found on the roads that shoot off the square, notably Rue Maréchal Foch and Rue du Château. Other good streets for local gifts and clothes are the pedestrian areas of Rue Serviez and Rue Cordelières. In these areas you'll be able to find many big chain stores like H&M, Zara and Sephora.

Pau-Pyrenees Airport (PUF)



Pau-Pyrenees Airport, Aéroport Pau Pyrénées, is located seven kilometres north of the city centre and about an hour's drive from the Pyrenees' ski stations and the beaches of France's south-west coastline.

IDELIS shuttle bus runs from Pau-Pyrenees Airport to Pau town centre and Pau train station. The buses depart from the airport every hour. From the train station the bus leaves approximately every hour from 6:30am to 7:50pm. You can buy tickets directly from the bus driver and the journey from Pau-Pyrenees Airport to Pau train station takes about 30 minutes. However, please notice the IDELIS shuttle bus does not run on Sundays or on French public holidays, and that it is advisable to book a taxi instead. A list of approved taxis can be found at the information desk and also on display at the entrance to the terminal outside.

Passport & Visa



Citizens of European Union (EU) and European Economic Area (EEA) countries do not need a visa to enter France, only a valid ID. Many other countries, including the United Kingdom, United States, Canada, United Arab Emirates, Australia, and New Zealand, benefit from visa-free entry for short stays of up to 90 days within a 180-day period.

Visitors from visa-exempt countries must hold a valid passport and, starting in late 2025, will need to apply for an ETIAS (European Travel Information and Authorisation System) authorisation online before travelling.

For those requiring a visa, such as travellers from some Middle-East, African or Asian nations, a Schengen visa must be obtained prior to arrival. All travellers should ensure their passport is valid for at least three months beyond their intended stay.

Best Time to Visit



Warm weather travellers will appreciate summer in Pau, when the temperatures are pleasant, but not too hot. The warm season lasts from mid-June until the end of September and July is the busiest month for tourism.

Winter sports lovers looking for snow will want

to visit from late January to early March instead, for the best chances of entertainment. In this case, February is the busiest month.

Spring and Autumn are the less crowded seasons, which makes them good for finding deals. Note that rain is more frequent during these periods.

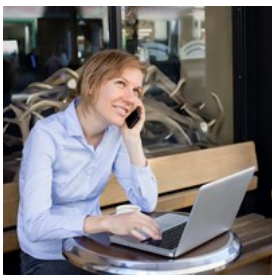
