THE CITY

Saddar, the commercial heart of Karachi, is a magnet for visitors. Its wide boulevards and narrow side streets host a variety of markets and bazaars, showcasing the city's bustling street life. Along Zaibunnisa Street, you'll find fine examples of Victorian architecture, a legacy from colonial times, while Muhammad Ali (MA) Jinnah Road features Karachi's most famous landmark — the Quaid Mausoleum. Saddar is also a good area for budget accommodation, and for affordable eats, Burns Road is a must-visit, known for its mouth-watering street food and traditional dishes.

South of Saddar, along the coastline, lie the upscale neighbourhoods of Clifton and DHA (Defence Housing Authority). Clifton's marine promenade is a popular evening spot for locals, who gather to dine at the numerous restaurants by the boatyard or to enjoy a stroll while admiring one of the world's tallest water fountains. Clifton Beach is another highlight, where you can ride camels or horses along the shoreline. In the neighbouring DHA area, Zamzama Boulevard offers a range of designer boutiques, coffee shops, and stylish restaurants, attracting a well-heeled crowd. For art enthusiasts, the nearby Canvas Gallery showcases contemporary Pakistani art.

DO & SEE

Most visitor attractions are concentrated in the southern district, while the outlying beaches and islands make for excellent short trips out of the city. If you're keen on learning more about the city's history, museums like the National Museum of Pakistan and Mohatta Palace Museum are not to be missed.

Mazar-e-Quaid



Karachi's most prominent landmark is a memorial to Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah, the founder and first head of state of Pakistan. The mausoleum is where Pakistan's great leader remains buried, making the location of immense historical significance to the local populace.

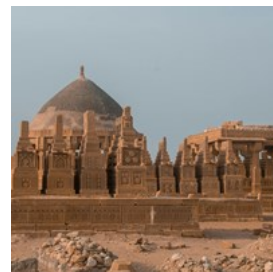

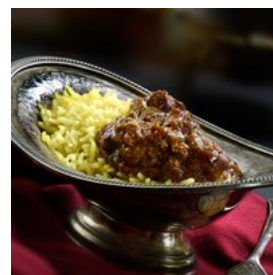
DINING

Eating in Karachi is a gourmet's dream, with a seemingly endless selection of eateries ranging from the cosmopolitan finery of upmarket restaurants to the traditional delights served by street vendors. Among the most popular local dishes are nihari, a stew made from beef or lamb, and biryani; these are almost always accompanied by a variety of breads such as naan, paratha, or chapati. After a rich, spicy meal, it's always nice to refresh the palate with one of the traditional desserts, a particular Pakistani favourite being kulfi (a type of ice cream). Don't forget to bring cash, as restaurants outside the city centre may not accept cards.

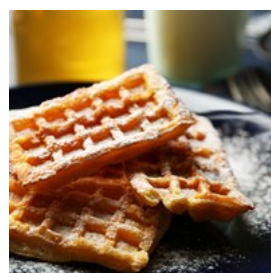

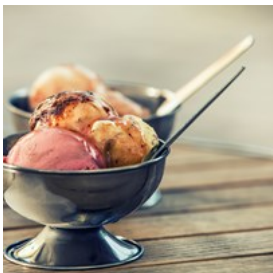

Nightlife in Karachi centres around dining, with restaurants typically staying open late. Alcohol sale and consumption are not legally allowed in Pakistan, so alcohol-free drinks, such as teas and juices, often substitute wine and beer during evening outings. Parties involving alcoholic drinks do happen, but these are largely kept hidden, and information about when and where they take place can only be obtained by word of mouth. Non-Muslim foreign visitors may be served alcohol at some high-end hotels.

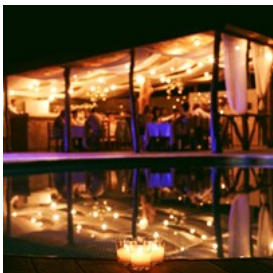

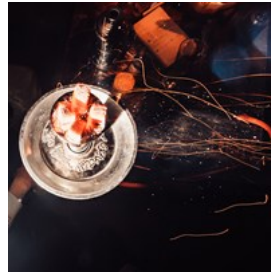

Saddar, the old area of the city, is home to a number of markets. Zainab Market and Bhori Bazaar are full of stalls selling handcrafted items such as woodwork, clothes and leather garments. For jewellery, head to Sarafa Bazaar, which is a gold and silver market, while the Empress Market is great for spices and worth a trip for the atmosphere alone. Aside from the souks, Zaibunnisa Street is lined with fashionable boutiques and jewellers, while Tariq Road in the neighbouring PECHS district offers much of the same.

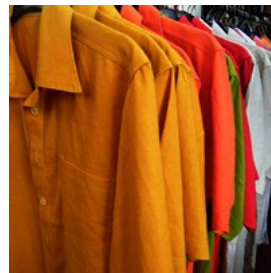

TOURIST INFORMATION

Passport / Visa



Most travellers need to apply for a visa before entering Pakistan. This can be done online through the Pakistan Online Visa System or at

one of Pakistan's diplomatic missions. The tourist eVisa allows a stay of up to 30 days and must be used within 90 days of issuance. Required

documents include a passport photo, a copy of the passport, a travel itinerary, and an invitation letter.

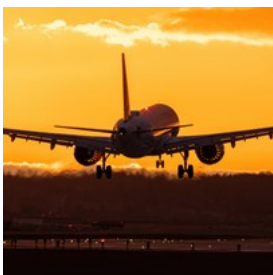
Visa on arrival is available for citizens of 65 countries, applicable to those travelling as part of an organised tour group or for business. This visa allows a 30-day stay. Nationals of the Maldives, Nepal, Samoa, Tonga, and Trinidad and Tobago enjoy visa-free entry to Pakistan.

Indian passport holders, as well as foreigners of Indian origin, face additional regulations and are not issued tourist visas. Instead, they may enter on different visa types, such as for business or religious tourism. Indian citizens, along with those from Bangladesh, Bhutan, Israel, Nigeria, Palestine, Somalia, and Uganda, must register with the police upon arrival.

Jinnah International Airport (KHI)



The Jinnah International Airport lies 15 kilometres northeast of the city. Taxis are always available for hire outside the arrivals building. It takes approximately 25 minutes to travel from the airport to downtown Karachi. Agree on the price before boarding the cab, and familiarise yourself with the average fare at your time of travelling.

A bus runs from dusk to dawn every 30 minutes. The journey takes approximately 50 minutes, but

heavy traffic may extend this time.

Best Time to Visit



The best times to visit Karachi are either at the very start of the summer monsoon season (in July), or during the winter months (from December to February). Mind that Karachi maintains rather high humidity levels throughout the year. The summer months, roughly from May to September, tend to get quite hot, temperatures sometimes reaching highs of 45°C.

Public Transport



Red Bus Karachi (Peoples Bus Service), with air-conditioned buses and priority seating for disabled and elderly passengers, runs on several routes across the city. The red buses serve the general public, while the pink buses are for women only.

Karachi Circular Railway (KCR) is a partially revived system that connects key areas and aims to expand with electric trains.

Auto rickshaws are widely used for short distances, offering an affordable and quick way to navigate through the city. Rickshaw drivers often park near commercial centres on busy

roads.

Mad Max-style old-fashioned buses are fascinating to look at and can be considered art, but they aren't particularly safe, comfortable, or predictable.

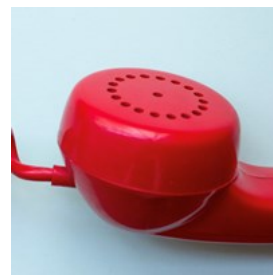

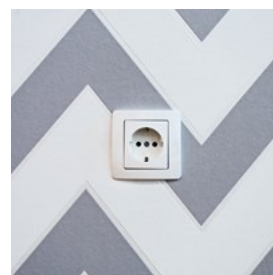
