
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

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

THE CITY



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With over a million inhabitants within the metropolitan area, Leipzig is the largest town in the German state of Saxony. It was originally a Slavic settlement called Lipsk, but quickly developed into a commercial centre, located at the intersection of several major trade routes. In the 16th century, it turned into one of the major cultural centres in Europe, and in the 18th century, it became a major literary centre, with young Goethe studying at its renowned university.

Composers Mendelssohn and Wagner are both connected to the city, although it is Bach who has had the biggest impact on Leipzig, having served as cantor at the famous Thomaskirche. After the end of the Cold War, Leipzig has staged an amazing turnaround to become one of Germany's most popular tourism destinations.

Today, Leipzig is a vibrant and diverse city teeming with attractions. With its long history as a trade hub, the shopping options are exceptional. Cultural enthusiasts will enjoy the opera house, numerous museums, and art institutions. As a university town, Leipzig boasts a lively nightlife scene, particularly in the Drallewatsch pub area — a must-visit for those looking to experience the city's dynamic party atmosphere.

St Thomas Church

Passport / Visa



Germany can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, the UAE

and most countries in America. If you are unsure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend contacting the embassy or consulate in your country. International (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter the Schengen zone. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport, but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.




