Pisa is strategically located in the central part of Italy, at only 12 km from the Ligurian Sea, 20 km from the harbour of Livorno and the ferries heading to the Elba Island, Sardinia and Corsica, and 80 km from Florence.

This city is most known for its leaning tower, but it also preserves, along with the whole complex of Piazza dei Miracoli — UNESCO World Heritage Site — and its medieval centre, numerous masterpieces of architecture and medieval history.

The area around Pisa is also excellent for farm holidays, trekking, beaches and water sports on the Versilian coast.

## THE CITY

Say Pisa — and you immediately think of the Leaning Tower, one of the most famous monuments in the world. Pisa, however, is much more than just its tower. It is also home to the extraordinary complex of buildings known as the Piazza dei Miracoli (Square of Miracles), with its magnificent cathedral and baptistery. Step away from the tower and you'll discover the old town with Renaissance palaces, medieval tower-houses, churches in Romanesque and Gothic style, the Botanic Gardens (one of the oldest in Europe, recently restored), and the River Arno, which you can admire by walking through old streets called Lungarni.

Pisa was the birthplace of Gailileo Galilei and is home to the important University of Pisa, founded in 1338, and the Scuola Normale Superiore, opened in 1813. As an Etruscan settlement and a Roman town, Pisa formed part of the Longobardo Kingdom, and then of the Carolingio Empire before becoming part of Italy after 1861. The medieval period coincided with the peak of Pisa's economic and political power. Pisa was one of the four Italian coastal republics until it was annexed by the Republic of Florence in 1406.

Pisa is the starting point to discover the province, with its unspoilt and well-preserved

landscape. Do not miss a visit to San Miniato (50 km), Volterra (65 km), San Gimignano (80 km) and Florence (105 km).

The boat service in Pisa will let you enjoy the architectural scenery of the Lungarni, or the natural beauty of the nearby San Rossore Natural Park, in which several important races and dressage competitions take place.

Pisa celebrates traditional events such as the fascinating Luminara (a candlelight festival), the historical Regata (a boat race on the Arno river) and the Gioco del Ponte (an ancient contest on the Ponte di Mezzo). The three of them take place every year in June.

An alternative could be a festival of international sacred music called Anima Mundi. It takes place between September and October in the Cathedral and Monumental Cemetery.

# Pisa Cathedral & Baptistery of St John



Pisa Baptistery

Giovanni) shares grounds
with Pisa Duomo (where
the Leaning Tower is
located). It took more

than two centuries to complete. This amazing



marble Baptistery is the largest one in the whole of Italy, and dates back to the 12th century. Pay your visit in the early morning to experience the amazing acoustics without the hum of the crowd.

The Cathedral is an incredible work of art with more than a thousands years of history, and its design influenced many other buildings in the whole country.

### Via Aurelia (Aurelia Street to Rome)



Via Aurelia, constructed in approximately 241 BC, played an important role in times of the ancient Roman Empire, to connect the cities of Pisa

and Rome and to enable trouble-free and efficient movement of defensive forces and goods between them. Today, the drive along the coast might not be the fastest way anymore, owing to the often heavy traffic, but it for sure is one of the most beautiful rides in Italy.

Today, the modern Strada Statale 1 ocupies the same route and is informally known as La Via Aurelia. Remains of several Roman bridges can still be found along the road, including the Cloaca di Porta San Clementino, Ponte del Diavolo, Primo Ponte, and the Secondo Ponte (the last three in Sta Marinella).

# The Leaning Tower



One of the most outstanding architectural structures of medieval Europe (partly due to human error during construction), the

Leaning Tower is today the most famous landmark of Pisa. It is the bell tower of the Cathedral whose construction began in 1173, and continued for over two centuries. This miscalculated eight-story building is over 55 metres high and leans at an angle of 3.99 degrees. Without any doubts, this popular tourist attraction is a "must" when visiting the city. Don't forget the camera, since this is a perfect place to take some amusing photos.

sections that contain the botanical school, gardens, ponds, greenhouses and various buildings. Major collections include herb gardens and arboreta, as well as the old botany institute of late 16th century, with a façade ornamented with sea-shells.

# National Museum of the Royal Palace



The Royal Palace was built, as commanded by the House of Medici, in the late 16th century, and became the National Museum in 1989. Today,

it hosts numerous paintings, sculpture, tapestries and decorative art pieces that belong to the courts of the city government, such as the Medici, Lorena and Savoia, as well as some private collections. The building still has the appearance of an aristocratic residence, with fittings and furniture from the 17th to 19th centuries.

# **Knights' Square**



The beautiful Knights'
Square was the political
centre of the Republic of
Pisa. During the 16th
century, it was radically
transformed by Giorgio

Vasari and became the seat of the new military order of the Knights of St. Stephen. The square is dominated by the Palazzo della Carovana, whose façade is completely covered in sgraffiti and that, today, hosts the Scuola Normale



Superiore, founded by Napoleon in 1810.

# Lungarnos



Lungarnos are quays that run along a river. The Lugarnos of Pisa, with their beautiful palaces and romantic bridges over them, have been the

heart and soul of the city for centuries. Today, it is possible to walk along them to admire river Arno and its surroundings and, especially if the weather is good, to stop and eat an ice cream or get a drink in one of the several cafes along them.

### Santa Maria della Spina



The rather small Santa Maria della Spina church, erected around 1230 and later enlarged in 1325, has one of the most outstanding Gothic

edifices in Europe. Its riverside location adds to the iconic status, making it one of the most photographed structures in the city. You can find it on the left bank of the River Arno, opposite the National Museum of Pisa.

The name of della Spina ("of the thorn") comes from the presence of a thorn, recognised as a part of the crown of thorns placed on Christ. The relic was brought to this church in 1333.

#### Basilica of San Piero a Grado



Not far from the city centre lies this basilica, which is said to have been built upon the place where St. Peter landed on his way from the Aegean

Sea to Rome. If you walk in, you can admire medieval paintings and beautiful frescoes - both on the left and the right side of the church - dating to between 1200 to 1300, and around the location, where a small village has arisen, one can go for a walk and look for some local restaurants.

## **National Museum of San Matteo**

# **Museum of Human Anatomy**



Travellers who enjoy going slightly off the beaten track should not miss the Museum of Human Anatomy in Pisa. First opened in 1832, the



museum collected thousands of pieces of highly accurate anatomical models made for educational-scientific purposes. Certainly an unusual and macabre attraction.

A section of the museum is dedicated to anatomical paintings by Giovanni Paolo Mascagni, who was famed for his mind-blowingly intricate and accurate colour illustrations.

Another section contains archaeological finds, such as funerary objects from pre-Columbian civilisations, with fabrics, vases and various utensils, mummies and sarcophagi.

In Italy, coffee is just as important as pasta. If you want to act like a local when ordering your coffee, there are some unwritten rules you should keep in mind.

Cappuccino, Caffelatte or any other kind of coffee with a lot of milk should only be drunk in the mornings, before 11 am.

When you order an espresso, don't use the word espresso, which actually is just a technical phrase. Ask the barista for simply "un caffè".



# Galileo Galilei Pisa International Airport (PSA)



Pisa International Airport
"Galilei" is located only 1
km from Pisa Central
Railway Station and from
the town centre. Just
outside the Passenger

Terminal, you will find the new high-speed, automatic "People Mover" service, which will take you directly to Pisa Central Station with departures everyday, every 5-8 minutes, from 6 am to midnight.

Outside the Passenger Terminal, you will find the "P6 Area" for buses. Tickets can be bought at the Info Point, in the Arrivals Terminal.

You may also be interested in renting a car. In this case, there is a dedicated Terminal easily reachable by a 5-minute walk or by a free shuttle that you can take just outside the Passenger Terminal (on the arrivals side).



A taxi service is provided around the clock, with departures in front of the airport (on the arrivals side).

## Passport / Visa



Italy can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE and

most countries in America. If you are not sure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend you to contact the embassy or consulate in your country.

In order to enter the Schengen zone, international (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip. Citizens from Schengen countries can travel without a passport, but they must bring with them a valid ID during their stay.

### **Best Time to Visit**



Tuscany, like the whole of Italy, generally has a temperate climate, with differences depending on individual geographical areas. As Pisa is situated

just a few km from the Tyrrhenian Sea, you can enjoy milder summers and winters.

The best months to visit Pisa are April, May, June, September and October, with very pleasant sunny days. The summer months (July and August) can be very hot and that would make your vacation less enjoyable.

June is the month when this city is especially worth a visit, as the three main traditional events — the Luminara, the Regata and the Gioco del Ponte — take place during that time.

## **Public Transport**



Pisa is a small city, hence the best way to see it is on foot. The company that operates Pisa's local transport system is CPT (Compagnia Pisana

Trasporti) and its information office is in Piazza Sant'Antonio.

The new LAM service divides the bus network into two main lines (LAM red and LAM green, that stop at the most "popular" spots in the city centre) and guarantees departures every 10 minutes. You can purchase bus tickets, which you will then validate on board, at the Central Railway Station, in Via Cesare Battisti 53, or directly on board (at a higher price, though).



Local, interregional, Intercity and Eurostar trains stop at Pisa Central Railway Station, connecting Pisa to the main Tuscan and Italian destinations. Train tickets are sold at the ticket office, but for short routes — up to 20 km — also at the newsagents'. Self-service ticket machines can also be found in the station.




